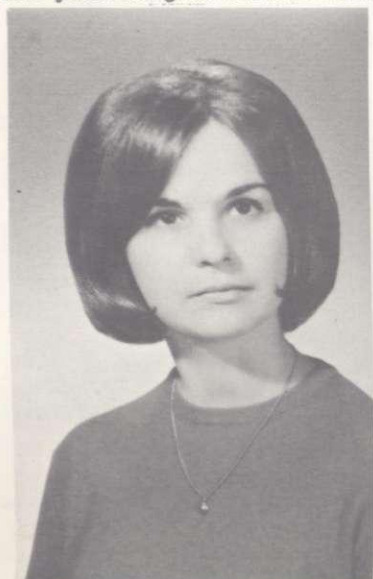

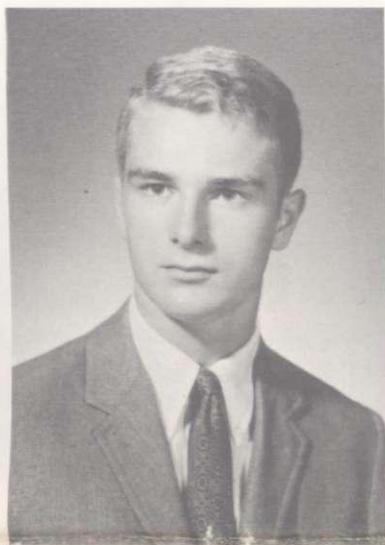

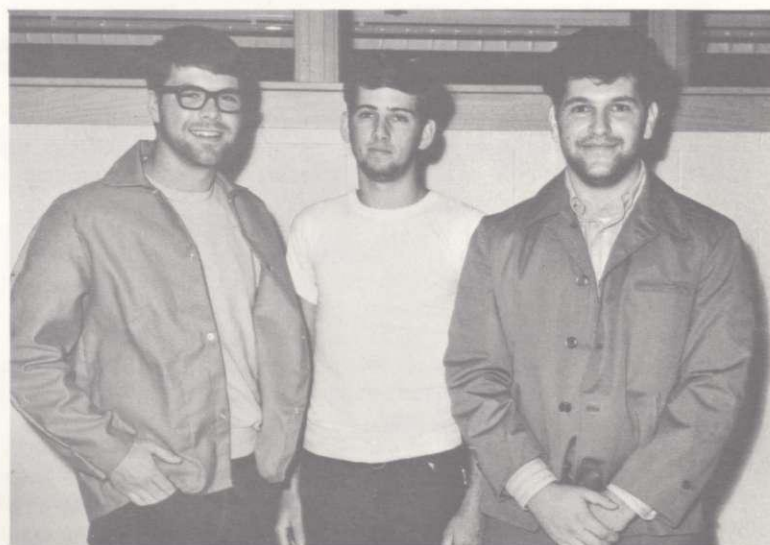

## The Walls of Our Minds

I went to a ghetto high school. I spent four years there and had many things pounded into my head, but by the time I graduated I realized the confines of my "education." I entered the school as an optimistic freshman, but by my senior year, it was evident that something was missing. I suppose it wasn't really the fault of the school. It was the town we lived in. A ghetto on Chicago's south side. There wasn't much that the school could do with what they had to work with. Everybody's superiority feelings and prejudices built insurmountable walls on the edges of our town and nobody would have moved for the world. It wasn't really so bad there--to live in. Things were comfortable. So you see, the school just rode along on the tide. And they didn't try to change it either.

Oh, there were exceptions. In my senior year, I had a couple teachers who really tried. They tried to widen our narrow minds, but at that stage of the game it was kind of late. Their valiant attempts usually met with blank stares or whispered obscenities in the back of the room. Nobody really believed them--things weren't supposed to be the way they described. Things weren't that way in our town. They must have gotten awfully exasperated. But I suppose that's what you face when you try to be different in a place where different-ness is "out."

I don't suppose things would have been so bad if anyone had bothered to think. But they mostly refused to, and everyone just lived on the idea that he was right and nothing was going to change that. Some people were even proud

of our ghetto. They showed it off to visitors as a nice place to raise children. I suppose it was, but what happened when they weren't children anymore?

Well, I grew up there so I guess I know. But some people never will. Some people will never accept the idea that all people are human beings, that no one is superior or inferior. They won't believe that an idea isn't bad just because it's new or different or way out of the ordinary. They won't admit that our town is a ghetto.

A ghetto? You're crazy, they'd scream! Look at our fine homes, our well kept-up yards, our clean appearance, our large percentage of hard-working people, our many churches, our efficient town government, our excellent school system. This isn't a ghetto!

What would I answer? Just six simple words: Look at all the locked minds.

Maybe they wouldn't understand. But then they probably wouldn't want to. After all, life is pretty easy in a ghetto. When you listen to the meaningful words of Peter, Paul and Mary, you can just hum the tune a little bit louder. When Channel 5 reveals some startling expose, you can turn your TV off. When some shocking literature comes into print, you can appeal to the town council or the library board to get it banned. And if things ever do get kind of rough, you can always run into a church and pray. There, now doesn't that make you feel better?

Those wonderful ghetto walls keep things pretty calm, don't they? But watch out, there's a world on the other side.

In 66, Jim Butler who is now in Med school going for a degree in dentistry won the right to sleep under the red blanket. Jerry Lutz was next on the growing list of M.V.P. winners. Last year Bob Dwyer won it along with the Hammond Times Athlete of the Year Award and a few others. And this year Wayne Brumm won the award at the end of the first decade. Tradition is something all young schools need and this is truly one of the best traditions T.F. South will ever have.

Another award underclassmen can strive for is the Schroder Memorial Football Valor Award which has annually been awarded since 1967 to the athlete who has showed the most courage in the previous football season. This seems fitting since Dick was a member of South's first football squad. In 67 the first award winner, Frank Grundler, who has since moved to Florida, but is attending the University of Indiana. Last year the winner was Tom Padjen who is a teammate of Bob Dwyer at Iowa State University. And this year's winner

This award has been forseen to be a lasting tradition because of the type of a man Gene was in both athletics and in life in general.
